BIOFEEDBACK MONITOR SYSTEM

Dear Friends? -- an open letter to the editors of People Soup

#1. I'm pissed off; I feel you put down and everyone else who works hard for social change, hours that are often difficult and thankless. Let me quote your editorial in the last <u>People Soup</u>: "Obviously there is an inconsistency in some people's energy and inconstreint, in some people who will rant and rave about an issue, participate in con-sciousness raising, then say that they are too busy with surviving the world as it is." The editorial then mentions (I think condescendingly) what "these people" should do.

I have no objection to you criticising people serves the interest of Nixon, Ford, for saying one thing and doing another ("liberFreactionary forces in this country. lism"), in fact, it's a good idea (though what was it doing in the middle of an editorial about the official non-political purpose li of LRY?). I think those inconsistencies should be pointed out in a context that i) directly communicates that there are people (like myself) who really are committed to social change, as well as these "summer soldiers", 2) deals with the reasons people have little energy for social action (such as sexism/racism in the left, or real needs to survive that energy drain)--rather than putting them down as mixed-up people who need to get their heads together, 3) encourages people to become more committed to social action rather than dismisses the energy they do have as "ranting and raving".

The problem of "liberalism" is a serious one. but is not constructively dealt with by publishing paragraphs such as the one in that



I'm also pissed that you published without comment the letter that dismisses Senate Bill #1's chance of passing in the Legislature. The letter contains mis-information that could be damaging to attempts to organize LRYers against the Bill. First of all, SB-1 as is will certainly not pass. But the issue is whether or not it can be amended. Most liberals in Congress feel that if you take out a few sections that blatantly revoke the Bill of Rights, it's a workable and passable bill.

The people against SB-1 are saying it's impossible to satisfactorily amend it, that it's too huge a document to amend. The National Lawyers' Guild estimates that it would take over 1,000 amendments to take out all the repressive features in the bill; that, the problem is partly the philosophy (written by John Mitchell among others) behind it that's found on every single page in the subtlest of forms, that even if it were amended, the amendments currently before the Senate (as of March 1976) are recognized by its supports as cosmetic and do not include changing many important sections. For ple, the section remains that prohibits protest near a government building, or obstruc-tion of national defense--such as striking at a munitions factory; I could go on with examples for a very long letter.

And "even if the Bill managed to pass" (very possible) once the bill became law it would be impossible to reverse--it would have to be done piece by piece, case by case--since it would no longer exist as a separate entity. we would be dealing with the entire legal

<u>code</u> of the United States. That means that by the time even major implications were discovered by the public and courts, and by the time they were declared unconstitutional. many people would have suffered, many social actions thwarted, repression would be in force that would make the McCarthy era look like a rightist's toy gun.

Clearly if you are going to publish as formed a letter as the one on SB-1, you ha responsibility to your readers to also provide a more accurate account of the situation. This is our civil liberties, our fight against repression, not some journalism game; there is no such thing as neutrality. lishing that letter without comment only serves the interest of Nixon. Ford, and the

Obviously, sexuality is something most the only, sexuality is something most teenage people are trying to deal with, and personally, I would have had an infinately harder and more painful time with it if I hadn't been involved with LRY.



I started sorting out my feelings about sex in a course through my church using a UUA Human Sexuality kit. Most of us weren't into LRY yet. We developed into an open trusting group which turned into a local. We got into subjects that I was sure could never be discussed without the greatest embarrassment. During the greatest embarrassment. During one discussion of masturbation, I was amazed to find I could be sitting there with a group of people I didn't even know, calnly talking about "it". At different points we saw slides on homosexuality and a really beautiful film of a couple making love in a field. all of which utterly fascinated me, being completely innocent in this realm. I noticed that it satiated my desire to sneak into porno films to see what all the excitement was all about. Every time I discovered that previously sensitive subjects actually could be discussed openly in a group, something clicked in my head. I began to experience sexuality as a common human phenomenon instead of some mysterious force to be ignored whenever

I feel that the general attitude I've seen in LRY is indisputably healthier than the average of our society. I take it so much for granted now that I forget how different it is. now that I rouge now afterent It is.
At my first conference, I noticed
people subtly (or not so subtly) pairing
off, some of it sexual and some of it
just to sleep together. Some people
slept alone, some curled up in a huge lump of sleeping bags and bodies. Everything seemed to be accepted and I was impressed by the way no one pushed me into anything. Suddenly, the public high school morality of women as conquests/ "whores"/ego reinforcements and men as conquerors/"wolves"/status symbols was inapplicable. The attitudes toward contraceptives was good. Everyone seemed to be aware and not doing any-

thing stupid.
With no one whispering behind my back and no parental eyes/trips on me there was alot of frightening freedom and decisions. Nothing covert was pressuring re. I saw suddenly that this was my body, these are my actions, nr responsibilities. My response was to recvaluate my programed attitudes, and to learn to handle the freedom.

I see now that I would have had to assume this power over my life at some time, and I'm really glad that y was able to start then. Problems only multiply when someone is forced to dony their feelings, follow the dictates of society and wait till the arbitrary age of 18 to explore themselves as sexual/sensual beings. New subject.

New Subject.

I really like LRY customs of touching, despite the fact that they can be games. It was great to discover that I could touch my friends, hug them, tickle them, pile on them with 20 others and dance around in circular ameobas.

What a change from appologizing every What a change from appologizing every time I brushed someone! It was ensier to comfort people, to reach out. The atmosphere made me feel generally better about my body and its functions. —I spent a long time feeling that LRYers were intrinsically superior

to the general population. Arch't we more intellegent, sensitive, free, loving, creative and accepting? LRYers didn't play games, didn't push for conformity to social norms. I got disturbed when the organization started going down hill and angry that it wasn't going down that and angry that I washed involved in social actions. But I've been steadily losing my "holier than thou" attitude(a process called cynicism). Amazingly enough, we aren't all that liberated. There is lots of veiled sexism, roles and games. But I feel we are generally open to new ideas and breaking down old patterns. I see more and more LRY men careing and being supportive of each other for an example.

I feel that personal growth/awareness/ exploration is the central factor in LRY that makes it valuable and ties together the great variety of experiences Nothing that is designed to make the LRY organization function better or more efficiently is as important as the growth of the individuals. If you leave a position of leadership, you're just leaving it open for someone else to learn from it. This applies to all levels and is the reason that we don't eject our leaders for 5 year terms. Also for this reason, I'm no longer concerned about the lack of socal activism in LRY as a group, because it is only relevant to the experiences of individuals (aside from the obvious benefit to society). We have such a high turnover rate it would be hard to get, anything accomplished as an organization anymay

find a beneficial way of lookin at LRY is as a tool, a safe environmer in which you can grow and nurture yourself. It's some thing to help you and then let go of for someone else. You work for it and it works for you. You use it, it uses you, but you are always more important.







Certainly this viewpoint has its bones to munch on...there is truth to the idea that politicious are almost all corrupt, that you as an individual can't change much, that it's important to take care of yourself and make sure you survive emotionally and physically in this world, and that having a revolution doesn't guarantee an elimination of classes (the split between the rich and the workers), of sexism, racism, ageism or any other oppressive institution, or even guarantee a fundamental change in the economic system (let alone a change for the better).

The other side of this lie says that if you don't like the so-called "realism" you have to act as though the world (or yourself) was already the way you'd like it to be; so you say "I shouldn't feel jealous" and try not to say I should help leadous and try not to feel jealous, which doesn't deal with the reality that led to your jealous feelings (as If jealousy drops from the sky) and so can't really change things. Or you act as though a few demonstrations are going to change U.S. foreign policy or being nice to everybody you meet is goin; to foster good will in the world: This viewpoint, too, has its points to argue. When you feel bad about being jcalous it's a good idea to not just assume things have to be that way and suffer. To stand up against U.S. involvent in Portugal, Senate Bill-1 (which would revoke most of the Bill of Rights), and other political actions that obviously or insidiously affect your life, is an important thing: it's taking

responsibility for the changes that need to be made in your life and your world. Action is the only way things change.

sides run into contradictions, though Both sides run into contradictions, though "Realism" Is more than being realistic--lt's not acting to make changes or it's working for changes with the short-sighted attitude that perpetuates the basic problems. And so nothing gets solved. "Idealism" doesn't deal with the real situation, and so can effect no changes, no matter how utopian the vision.



If we can steer a course between the two, keep our vision as we work realistically towards it, then we will see changes made towards a world of our creation, our lives under our own control. This applies to everything, from personal matters to creating a people-oriented society. Throughout this process we will err one way or the other, and what the outcome will be depends upon whether not we correct our mistakes.

We should all make a commitment to these rules and work to follow them. It means putting our ultimate interest ahead of immediate selfishness; it means heading towards a unified committed group, and when that happens, and when other groups do the same, what was once fierce is now tame, what once seemed to be a tiger reveals itself to be made of paper. The world is before us to RULES FOR GROUPS WORKING FOR SOCIAL CHANGE (AND PEOPLE COMMITTED TO EACH OTHER)
adapted from Mao Tse Tung's "Combat Liberalism"

- Criticize each other. It's one of the surest signs of caring. But don't criticize or argue for it's own sake, or attack someone; do it so there will develop a common feeling/agreement of who you are, what you believe, and how you will accomplish your goals. Do it
- you will accomplish your goals. Do it so that work gets done properly and progress is made. "I feel pissed and critical that you're late to this meeting..." or "I disagree with that idea..." Go into differences and do it thoroughly. Letting things slide for the sake of friendship harms both the group and the individual. Unprincipled peace in the long run festers and explodes like an appendix.


 Criticize publicly instead of privately. Bring your suggestions to the group; it's irresponsible to only say a criticism privately. Don't gossip behind people's backs. Don't wait until after the meeting to say your thoughts.

 Speak up even when things don't affect you personally. It's a sign of your commitment to each other that you take risks and don't play safe when you see something happening, for example, between two other people in the group.

- Actively participate in the group and persuade people (members of the group and everyone) of the truth. Do this
- Reason with and stop someone who's harming the interest of people.

If you don't know, learn. Realize you could be wrong. Correct your own mistakes. Care about yourself enough to change your behavior or beliefs when it's in your interest to do so. It's your responsibility to yourself as well as to the group to correct your mistakes. correct your mistakes.

12 EVERGREEN


I go to school at the Evergreen State College in Olympia, Washington, site of this year's Continental Conference. Evergreen is a very unusual place, and especially since it's so far from any centers of LRY activity, I thought it would be a good idea to tell everybody a bit about it.

Evergreen is an alternative college with about 2500 students. Interestingly, it's a fully-accredited four-year state college, not a private one. Tuition, therefore, even for out-of-state students (of whom there are an awful lot), is a lot less than at other alternative schools like Antioch or Bennington.

Academically, it's very different from most schools. There is an emphasis on interdisciplinary studies, rather than specialization. Instead of toking a number of unrelated courses with different faculty members, new students normally start out in what is called a basic coordinated studies program. This is usually a program involving from 40 to 120 students, and one faculty member for each twenty students. A basic CS program attempts to explore some large subject through various disciplines. For example, a program for next year entitled "Political Ecology" examines the relationship between---yup, politics and ecology. This involves studying local, state and federal politics, economics, biology, geography, ecology, etc. Coordinated studies programs are based on the idea that all disciplines interact to make the world and the people in it go 'round, so it's better to teach people to have some understanding of a whole system than to have everybody specialists in co's own little departments.

The second important mode of learning, after coordinated studies, is contracted studies. These can be either individual or in a group. What happens is that a student or a group of students get together with a faculty member (either side can take the initiative) and sign a contract to study a particular subject

that interests them. Individual contracts offer the most breadth for doing what you want to do; you can study practically anything and get credit for it, if you can find a faculty spensor. I don't mean 'study' in the hitting-the-books sense, necessarily, although that will probably be part of it-you can contract to do something (e.g., to design and build something) so long as it's a valid learning experience that's advanced enough to be worth college credit.



There are also some problems with the governing structure of the school; in short, it's set up as a benevolent dictatorship. 'Input' (which has become a pretty dirty word around here) from students, faculty and staff is encouraged, but decision-making power rests absolutely with a lew deams, administrators, and Board of Trustees members, who all too of the decision of the deams of the decision o

Nevertheless, it's a nent place to be. The students, compared to those at any other college I've seen, are very open, friendly and real. (They got long hair, too!) Visiting Evergreen when school is going on might prove to be an eye opener to anybody who thinks that LRYers are the only really hip, together people. Although I must admit that there are quite a few old LRYers here—it's definitely the kind of place that appeals to many of us.

Sounds good? Well, it's pretty exciting, when it works, but everything has its problems. (In fact, it's possible that everything in the world Is teetering on a brink between being a pile of shit and being God.) Since programs change completely from year to year, it's very difficult to try to plan your college eareer in advance. And for fairly simple reasons which I won't go into here, programs tend to be offered more because laculty want to teach them than as a result of student needs, which may or may not coincide.

Generally, people seem to have a better educational experience here if they have some idea of what they want before they get here. It can be asfully easy to fart around and take a little of this and a little of that and some more of something else because they look kind of interesting, though nothing is really close to what you wanted to study. The thing is, interdisciplinary philosophy or no, there's no clear four-year path to expertise in any field. You have to make it yourself and if you don't know where you're trying to get to, that makes it more difficult.

If you're about to graduate from high school, or, more advisable, if you've been out for a year or two and are trying to find a school worth your time and money, you might want to write to the Admissions Office. The Evergreen State College, Olympia, Washington 98505, and ask for the college Bullerin, the current Catalog Supplement, and maybe even entrance application forms. And do plan to come bere for Continental Conference.

Evergreen is an imperfect school in an imperfect world, but it's a lot less imperfect that most institutions.

The sheriff's lab found no fingerprints, although Deputy Grimes testified that he intended to kill Philip and twice pulled the trigger of the emptied weapon while holding it to Philip's head. Neither of the wounded deputies saw who

fired the shots, although it was estab-lished that they were no more than 10 feet from Allen and Grimes at the time. Nor did they see Philip touch the gun. There was no evidence that Philip ever touched the gun. We believe that with 4 fully-armed deputies at close quarters, he could not have held the gun in his hands and lived to tell about it. There are many instances where the

defense lawyers were crippled by sus-tained objections. The defense was not able to pursue a thorough examination of witnesses. Nor were they successful in attempts to determine whether jurors had

possible prejudiced attitudes.
The committee feels it is necessary now that it be known that "plea bargains" to reduce charges were offered by the prosecution. Philip L. Allen refused to accept these "bargainings" because he is

Sentencing and Rescinding of Bail

and was sentenced to five years to life on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon on a "peace officer". His attorneys motioned for an appeal and argued successfully to gain ball in the amount of \$25,000 from Judge Rittenband, who based his decision on Allen's punctilious behavior during the past trial. Defense then requested that existing ball be converted for the appeal; but on learning that process would take at least three weeks, procured a new bond, only to learn on the presentation of the bond, that the judge had rescinded the bail, but would conduct formal hearing on 10-7-75.

this hearing it was brought out that on 10-2-75, after granting bail, the judge had learned that Philip had spoken at a rally at his college proclaiming his innocence and had planned to speak at another one on the weekend. Allen's supporters are convinced that bail was rescinded to prevent him from speakball was rescinded to prevent him from speaking out. The prosection contended that Allen
continues to believe that he is innocent,
even though a jury of his "peers" had convicted him, and the D.A. stated that Allen
should now admit his guilt. The D.A. characterized Allen as an agitator and argued that
because he has not admitted his guilt he
could not give himself up a carry of his time. would not give himself up to serve his time, should be lose in his appeal.

American Civil-Liberties Union Enters Case

At this turn of events the ACLU officially entered the case to litigate whether had had any civil rights violated. This encouraging support as well as the heightened legal effort which included a 250 page appeal brief led to the recent change of Judge Rittenband's "heart".

While Philip's release on bail represents a hard won victory it is clear that his ulti-mate release will require an enormous expenditure of time and money.

The "Crime"

ï

On 8-19-75 a jury unanimously found Philip Allen guilty of the voluntary manslaughter of a deputy sheriff and assault with a deadly weapon on two others. The shooting occurred on January 1, 1975 at about 3:00 a.m. on Santa Monica Blvd. in L.A., in front of an establishment where deputing had resorted. establishment where deputies had responded to a call to investigate a broken window. Allen arrived on the scene just before the officers. The manager of the business informed them that Allen had a screwdriver and had threatened to commit suicide. The police converged on him, and, although he was quite passive, one officer applied an "Academy approved choke-hold" and at least two other deputies testified to have struck Allen with saps. Defense witnesses testified that office were administering such a beating that they even were striking each other, yet Allen was charged with disarming an officer and using the gun to commit the crimes.

At the hearing the D.A. was able to convince the jury with clumsy demonstrations how easy It was for Allen, 5'3", 135 pounds to extri-cate the gun from the holster of Deputy Sheriff Michael Grimes, over 6', 200 pounds, without his knowledge (according to Grimes he know his gun was missing only by instinct), and without anyone answering affirmatively during the trial to having seen Allen actually remove the gun which supposedly occurred in the presence of six officers and several civilian eve witnesses.

Beyond a Reasonable Doubt

The Philip L. Allen Defense Committee has more than a reasonable doubt about the proceedings leading to Allen's conviction and imprisonment, and cites the following:
* Phillp took a lie detector test which

showed him to be telling the truth. jury was not allowed to know of this

No paraffin tests were made on Philip or any of the deputies. This would have been positive proof of who really pulled the trigger.

INTI MCY PROGRAM: DEVELOPING PERSONAL RELATIONSHIPS

The goals of this experience are to help groups get acquainted quickly; to study the groups get acquainted quickly; to study the experience of self-disclosure; and to develop authenticity and trust within the group. It can be used with groups of all simes, at conferences and local groups, and takes about an nour and a half. It is important that the room or rooms be such that dyads(pairs) will be able to talk privately without disturbing others, Each dyad should either have a copy of the guidelines, or be able to see them posted on a chalk-board or posters. Group members should try to pair up with people they don't know or whom they know least well. Now distribute or post the guidelines. It's crucial that people understand

lines. It's crucial that people understand the ground rules.

Pairs meet for about an nour, and then form groups of three or four dyads to discuss their feelings about the experience. It is important to protect one's partners confidentiality, and this is where that protection starts.

Meet as a large group and have one person from each small group report on the feelings of their group.
This experience can be varied in several

ways:larger groups than dyads can be used; people who already know each other can do it; additional questions can be suggested; or the group can write it's own guidelines.Each person could write down an intimate question

(or two, depending on the size of the groun and the number of questions wanted) and the questions can be collected anonymously and

questions can be collected anonymously and posted so everyone can see them.



BRAINSTORMING: A PROBLEM-SOLVING ACTIVITY The goal of this activity is to generate a large number of ideas or solutions to a problem by refraining from criticism and evaluation, and to develop skills in creative problem solving session for your group. (It's

also fun)
To use this activity, you should have a group or groups of about six, and large sheets of paper and a magic and a large sheets of paper and a magic marker for each group. It takes about an hour and you need space so that the groups won't distract each other. The group should form a circle,

and choose some one to serve as secrectary. The secratary should take down every idea generated by the group. The following rules are very important and should be clear to all:

1. There will be no criticism during

the brainstorming phase.
2. Far-fetched ideas are encouraged because they may trigger more practical

3. Many ideas are desirable,

Imagine that you are east ashore on a desert island, made and with nothing but a belt. What can the belt he used for? Spend fifteen minutes generating ideas.

When the fifteen minutes are up, the ban on criticism is done too. Evaluate your ideas and select the best ones. (If there are four or more groups, two groups can get together.)

When all the groups have finished their lists, the secretaries act as spokespersons and take turns presenting spokespersons and take turns press the best ideas from their groups. Explore ways in which two or more ideas can be used together. Make a final list of the best

ideas, and rank order them on the basis of frasiblity.

How good a method for problem-solving is brainstorming? Discuss this question with the other members of

Note: Other objects can be used in the problem. You could be cast ashore with only a flashlight, a rope, an oar, or a corkscrew. You might want to actually have a belt, or whatever, to help you think.

The exercise is designed for eight to twelve members, and requires two to three hours. Each person should have a pencil, and a copy of the Peer Perceptions Ranking Form, and one of the Peer Perceptions Summary Forms. It is important that all members know each others names.

First off, each person should use the Peer Perceptions Ranking Form to rank order everyone else, from the person s/he considers most similar to her/hinself to the members s/he considers least similar. Beside each name, s/he should list the characteristics s/he had in mind.

Now distribute the Peer Perception Summary Form. The names of the group members should be listed in the same order in both vertical and horizontal columns on all forms.

Each person tells how s/he ranked all the other members and what s/he had in mind when s/he made the ranking. Hembers should record every ranking on the Summary Form and keep this form as a record. Each person reacts to the feedback s/he receives.

Dicuss the results, focusing on how it feels to be seen as "different", and how group members' differing values are expressed in the characteristics on which they based their ranking.
