
# → Look for the PARISH POLL

The Massachusetts Bay District has submitted a "Business Resolution in Support of Youth Programs" which will be on the Parish Poll. The Parish Poll is circulated to all Unitarian Universalist societies annually in the spring in order for members of the societies to vote to establish which resolu-tions will be on the final agenda of the UU General Assembly (G.A.) Each June the UU G.A. votes on business

resolutions that establish policy, programs, and priorities for the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). In order that this important resolution make it to the final agenda, it must be voted as one of the top eight business resolutions on the Parish Poll.

The jist of the "Business Resolution in Support of Youth Programs" is urging for greater knowledge and support for Liberal Religious Youth (LRY) and the continental Youth Adult Committee (YAC) programs from the UUA staff, UUA Interdistrict Representatives, Ministers, Directors of Religious "Education, and UUs in general. 

"Rainbow people" represent every race, every species, every living creature. They are the patriots of the entire earth. Stimulating practicel, intelligent, non-violent actions towards achieving a green peace on earth for all. These are the Greenpeace Foundation people. This can be you.

Greenpeace sheres a Quaker philosophy, called "bearing withess". This is the concept of viewing an injustice and accompanies.

Greenpeace shares a Quaker philosophy called bearing withebs". This is the concept of viewing an injustice and accepting the responsibility for being aware of that injustice. One may choose to intervene, or to standby, but may not turn away in ignorance. It is up to one's own conscience. Greenpeace bears withess to atrocities against life by subverting and presenting them to the world through direct, nonviolent, dramatic actions. Obstructing a wrong without condemning the guilty party is the only way Greenpeace sees as being efficient and correct. The greatest strength of living is life itself, and the commitment to protect all other lives.

Greenpeace follows the revolutionary, spiritual, and scientific path to the roots of ecology. These roots signify the tremendous beauty in understanding and appreciating all of life.

With this philosophy, Greenpeace be-

With this philosophy, Greenpeace believes we must feel for all forms of life --the whales, the seals, the forests, the seas, as we feel for ourselves. Ecology teaches us that humans are not the center of life on this planet, rather, the whole earth is a part of our "body". Being dedicated to the responsibility

seing declared to the responsibility of protecting our fragile world, Greenpeace volunteers have committed themselves to put their bodies on the line anywhere in the world for these beliefs. The original Greenpeace people started this in 1970 with. the first established Greenpeace Foundation in Vancouver, British Columbia. They gave a better focus on public concerns such as nuclear tests being conducted underground in Alaska. "We've had our people in some very flaky situations. It's a small miracle that no one has gotten killed." says Bob Hunter, Chairman of Greenpeace. Over the years, Greenpeace volunteers have sailed to the French nuclear testing zone in the South Facific, to be harrassed and eventually rammed by a French military vessel. They have inspired the New Zealand governmant to supervise renewed nuclear tests, and have been beaten savagely by French Commandoes, causing Dave McTaggart, owner/skipper to lose vision in one eye. Around 1975, Greenpeace started directing more attention and energy towards ending the slaughter of the declining population of great whales

them 11,000 miles and 84 days away from Vancouver on an excursion to the Soviet Whaling fleet operating off the coast of California This caused the International Whaling Commission meeting in Tokyo this past December to pledge that as a "gesture towards pres-sure from conservationists.", the Soviet Union would "dismantle" one of its whaling fleets. Sixty miles off of the CA coast, Greenpeace volunteers placed themselves in two-person rubber boats called Zodiacs, pow-ered with outboard motors (motors similar to those used in small motor boats) between Soviet killer-ships and their victims, the whales. This human-shield technique, which saved eight whales in the Pacific last sum mer, presented one Greenpeace crew with having to narrowly escape being hit by an It hit the whale explosive-tipped harpoon. who's life they were trying to save, and they were splattered with the dying creat-ure's blood and bits of intestine. Another Another crew also escaped an explosive-tipped har-poon while protecting a fleeing sperm whale. The Greenpeace Zodiscers began to fly American flags; perhaps this new practice has saved their lives, due to the other countries not wanting "bad press". "International accidents" are not smiled upon. For the fourth year, Greenpeace has tracked down whalers (killer ships and vessels) confront-ing their murderous actions. Greenpeaces' goal of publicizing social concerns and obtaining zero-quota for killing whales led them into a Soviet Whaler to hand out

born, were killed. Protesting these killings and the given reasons, Greenpeace has put out fact sheets and distributed these to the people of New Foundland. They stated the large and horrendous differences between killing seals for food, and killing seals for fashion. The seal pelts are used, as with whales, for fashion, cosmetics, soap, pet food, wax, toys, (even toy seal pups:), and other things that have very reasonable alternatives. Greenpeace also points out that tax payers of these places pau for this "mlanghter"


irts, and talk with the crew. In 1977, at least half of the seal pups

(even toy seal pups!), and other things that have very reasonable alternatives. Greenpeace also points out that tax payers of these places pay for this "slaughter house on ice", as late-Congressman Leo J. Ryan said after accompanying Greenpeace on an expedition in March of 1978.

Greenpeace wants citizens to realize

that approximately 14% of all pupe killed do not die instantaneously after being maliciously clubbed and illegally gaffed (by means of fish hooks) at 3 weeks of age. Other non-violent actions include an attempt at spraying the seal furs with an organic green dye, so as to make them worthless, but when the Canadian government heard of this, a law was created to prohibit this type of action. They have also pitched tents on the breading ground islands, ready to frighten the seals into the water at the approach of the hunters. Greenpeace pressured Soviet Whalers into breaking a 30 year tradition of sailing within 700 miles of the American west coast.



I'm beginning to question my own motives. I am not passing on my knowledge of what needs to be done and the easiest way to do it, to provide for a successful conference. (Let alone giving anyone the op-portunity to have practical experience.) My worst fear is that subconsciously I am determined to develop your dependence on me to a point where I can undermine the LRY conference system by simply leaving LRY. How much do you know about your fu-? Have you ever thought of how the ture? Name you ever thought of how the U.S. Government effects you? No? Well you should. The amount of stockpiled nuclear weapons in this country today is equivalent to 30,000 pounds of TNT per person. The Global Arsenal now includes over 12,000 strategic weapons (those designed to hit the U.S.S.R. from the U.S. and vice versa) and 22,000 tactical weapons for use at relatively close ranges. Nost of these weapons have an explosive Most of these weapons have an explosive power of 20 megatons with the capacity to destroy an area 100 times larger than the original nuclear bomb. Scientists now feel there are more than enough nuc-

lear weapons to bring about the total destruction of the earth many times over.

There are over 25 countries who spend over a billion dollars a year on arms. Last year, the U.S. Gov't spent 116.4 billion dollars an arms expenditures. The U.S. government had to borrow 14 billion Jollars last year to pay for the Defense Department deficit. The U.S. the Defense Department deficit. The spends three times more money on arms

than on health care.

So, you say, "How does this affect
me?" Well, I'll tell you. The production
of nuclear weapons hurts the economy. Your tax dollars go toward making an un-stable economy. When a product is made it gives people work and creates a flow of money by placing the product in circulation. Both the producer and the economy benefit. Stockpiled weapons go nowhere. They usually become obsolete with advancing technology. They create an infla-tionary effect on the economy because the materials used are usually scarce resources. Arsenal production is a highly skilled industry that employs relatively

What stockpiled weapons do to our foreign affairs also has a devastating effect. Nuclear buildups occur when a mood develops to scare one country into preparing for war: The U.S. and U.S.S.R. are leading the arms race, but their stockpiling only increases the threat to other countries. If one country has a nuclear ar-senal, it is not surprising that they all do. It's a form of defense that is made se-cure by the rationale that everyone has one. cure by the rationale that everyone has one. The security is FALSE. One nuclear bomb can level part of a country with the radiation killing everything else. How can thousands be, in any way, safe or secure?

So, still you ask, "How does this effect me?" Well, with the increase in the numbers of weapons and the advanced technology of production.

duction, we must also consider the threat weapons getting into the wrong hands. Nuclear weapons are made by the waste products of nucweapons are made by the waste products or nuc-lear reactors ("nuclear lemmons", as the Wall Street Journal labeled them). The Breeder re-actors that turn on America's t.v.s and keep our all electric homes running, produce en-ough radioactive waste to make one weapon a ough radioactive waste to make one weapon a week. It takes plutonium half a million years to lose its killing power. Basic chemistry courses teach the basic technological skills needed to make a nuclear bomb. Mith the availability of this much material, the opportunity of terrorists and organized crime obtaining these materials grows. This is a threat for our avisance. threat to our existence.

The preamble to the constitution:
"We the people of the United States, order to form a more perfect Union, estab-lish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

I only wrote this down to remind you that this country was founded on the rights


to provide for the common defense, and the general welfare of the people. I personally do not feel that having my tax dollars going towards stockpiling weapons (there are too many in the first place) and having the needs of people all around me ignored, is providing a very healthy defense, or promoting the gen-eral welfare of the citizens of the United States of America. There are enough nuclear weapons to kill

us off a million times over. One particle of plutonium the size of a grain of pollen can cause lung cancer if inhaled. The typical re-actor produces several hundred pounds of plutomium per year. The reactor safety systems are unproven, and plutonium and radiation leaks DO occur. No effective way has been developed for the disposal of waste material. All of this doesn't make me half as mad as thinking that the U.S. citizens weren't consulted when the government decided to build nuclear reactors. We were not warned that by the year 2000 there will be more than one hundred inactive, but highly rad-ioactive power plants in the world. The U.S. government did not adequately test the emergency core cooling systems used in every nuclear power plant for defects, which has become apparent with the increasing num-ber of atomic accidents. We are not asked by politicians who supposedly represent us, whether we want more than half of the fis-cal budget spent on arms rather than on hunan needs, education, health care, and em-ployment. The needs of people are being o-verlooked for the benefit of the militia. The very existence of America, as we like to think of it, "Land of the free", "Home of the brave", is being threatened by our own government. Every day our of our lives are in the balance— one accident, one stolen arsonal weapon or plan, one miscal-culation and half of the continental United States could be killed! I resent this

#### GET OFF YOUR CAN

Have you heard such phrases as "ban the can", "bottle bills", or "mandatory deposits"?

Have you been to Oregon recently and wondered why it had much less litter than other states? The reason is that Oregon has mandatory deposit legislation on the books. "What's mandatory deposit legislation?" you might ask. It is a law putting a minimum deposit on all soft drink and beer bottles and cans whether they are reusable or not. Deposit legislation means that all beverage containers are returned for reuse or recycling.

The first bottle bill was passed in Vermont in 1953. Before then, deposit legislation was not an issue because 90% of all beverage containers were refillable. As late as 1960, 50% of all beer and 95% of all soft drinks were sold in reusable bottles. Deposit legislation was not needed until the mid-sixties, when the beverage industry developed more convenient, glamorous containers and promoted the use of aluminum and steel cans. They began extensive advertising campaigns to sell their new products.

Throwaways are "easier" because when you are through drinking what's in them, you just throw the container in the trash for on the ground if you are a litter-bug). Deposit bottles have to be dragged all the way back to the store. One direct result of our throwaway society is that we have a dramatic increase in the amount of litter on our earth.

The Keer America Beautiful campaign became a very active, powerful anti-litter Ichby. It had many member organizations, a \$600 million a year budget, and transport such slogans as "People start pollution, people can stop it."

In the early 1970's, Keep America Beautiful was asked to take a position on
bottle bills. When it took a position,
it was against them, it soon became known
that Keep America Beautiful is a front for
the beverage and bottling industries. Mor
than 100 member organizations, like the Environmental Protection Agency, Audubon Society, Sierra Club, Garden Clubs of America,
League of Nomen Voters and National Wildlife Federation dropped out due to this.

Because of highpowered lobbying and extensive campaigns against it, deposit legislation is hard to pass. Conservationists, environmentalists, and citizen's groups are working to get container regulation legislation passed on the local, state, and federal levels,

President Carter has referred the bottle issue to a committee on Resource Conservation to make recommendations on deposit legislation and possible alternatives. President Carter probably will not act on this issue until the committee makes its recommendations.

A total of seven states have succeeded in passing deposit legislation (Connecticut, Delaware, Iowa, Maine, Oregon, and Vermont). The other 43 states all have pending bottle hills

Container regulation has become an important environmental concern. More than 70 billion beverage containers were thrown away in the United States last year. Studies have shown that bottle bills reduce litter, save energy and reduce air pollution. In states that have deposit legislation,

In states that have deposit legislation, when reusable bottles are returned to the store, they are sent back to the bottler washed in a caustic solution to sterilize them. They are then refilled with a beverage and sent back to the stores. Non-refilable bottles which are returned for deposit are crushed and recycled into new bottles.

Making glass from raw materials involves melting a mixture of sand, limestone, and borox, lead, and other stuff at temperatures between 1,400° and 1,500° C. (between 2,520° and 2,700° E). Crushed glass is often added to speed the melting process.

#### Pen Power

Now, everyone knows how to write a letter, but do you know how to write one that will influence Senators and Representatives? First think about exactly what it is you want to say: your position on the subject, what parts you want to emphasize, what information you have to back up your opinion, and how this is going to effect you and your community. Then, decide who you are going to write to: the President, a Senator from your state, a Representative from your district, a state official, or an official outside of your area (this is really a formality to figure out whether or not you can threaten her/him with your vote). Finally, write that letter!

As to the actual components of the letter, there are a few hints I can give you, but most of it is common sense. Here is a list I got from talking to my Congressperson (Andy McGuire) who said that if he got just FIVE letters in which people did most of these things, he would probably reconsider his vote.

- 1) Make the letter personal. Ask extremely specific questions, and write it out by hand if possible. That way it won't be thought of as a form letter and won't be answered with one. It may possibly even make it to a top aide's desk.
  2) Put as much information into it still
- Put as much information into it still keeping it brief. The more you can support your opinion, the more impact your letter will have.
- 3) Use political pressure if you can.
  Tell her/him that if s/he does not give a satisfactory answer, you will print both the letter and its response in your largest area newspaper (newspapers will print them by the way), or say that your disapointment in his/her vote will force you not to support her/him in the next
- 4) And most of all, act as if you know what you are talking about (DO know what you are talking about!), and get to the point! Little drawings and ten page reports will not impress her/him as much as a concise letter written by someone who obviously has done some research and thinking on the matter.

That's all there is to it. Keep these guidelines in mind, and you will begin to put our democratic system to work.

One more thing: NO NOT make up names

One more thing: NO NOT make up names so you can write more than one letter. All that does is invalidate any good you might

have done up until then. Remember: letting your opinion be known gives you power and influence, so... KEEP WRITING!!!

One bottle-making factory in Connecticut was told to meet Environmental Protection Agency's factory emissions control standards. It was given the choice between cleaning up its act or making bottles from crushed recycled glass. The people who managed the factory decided to make their bottles from recycled glass, and they found that their factory sent much less pollution into the atmosphere.

Large energy savings are a direct result of bottle bills because remelting glass does not require the high temperatures used to make glass from raw materials. According to a report the Governor of Oregon released in February 1977, that state saved 1.4 trillion BTUs per year-enough energy to supply the heating needs of 50,000 Oregonians.

A study done by the Federal Energy Administration claims that if every state pass ed a bottle bill, the U.S. could save up to 81 thousand barrels of oil per day (that's about 8t of the output of the Alaska pipeline) plus conserve material resources of 5.2 million tons of glass, 1.5 million tons of steel and 500,000 tons of aluminum per year. Changing the system could create between 80,000 and 118,000 jobs and reduce litter by 40-60%.

neposit legislation may not be as dramatic as nuclear proliferation or saving the whales, but it's just as important. Many things are involved in making an environment good or bad. We need to put energy into all facets of our environment.

## BIO-ECONOMICS

When examining humankind's influence on the natural world around us, there are two areas of study we must consider. The first is bio-economics, the ecological laws that dictate biological growth and regulate how resources are distributed and utilized by the populations of various organisms. The second consideration is the historical development of humankind's role in shaping shaping the eco-systems.

"Eco-system" refers to the complex network of energy/resource cycles, involving all biotic (living) and non-biotic parts of a particular environment. Everything is a resource: energy is the non-material resource that is employed in moving, changing, and using all material resources. Nothing is ever created or destroyed: it simply ges form. When we burn a log, or a cell ingests food, the material is broken down to smaller parts, and the energy held by the resource is released. This energy is eith-

er utilized or dispersed as free energy.

In any eco-system, the energy that is readily available for utilization is the one factor limiting biological expansion. As an eco-system matures, through the process of evolution (natural selection of those best survive and grow in the environment), living organisms progressively arrange themselves in more energy-efficient relation-ships to all the resource/nutrient cycles. A lower energy output on the part of the organ-isms yields a larger amount of available survival energy (food).

Where does the energy come from and how much is there? There are only two sources: the earth itself, geo-thermal energy which is virtually unused in biological processes, and the sun which is the source of all energy for the biosphere. One might equate the energy as follows: wind + hydropower + solar + biomass energy = available + potential energy.

When an organism has reached the point when an organism has reached the point where it is intercepting the nutrient/re-source/energy cycles as effectively as pos-sible; this is known as its "climax ecology" The population will stabilize, and major evolutionary changes will slow down or cease. A fully mature forest or lake eco-system exemplifies this. Very little free energy is dispersed: organisms utilize all resources and energy available with the greatest pos-sible yield. These stabilizations are the natural limits to growth that keep nature in such harmonious balance.


And what of this species Homo Sapien? How

have we placed ourselves within the eco-system? How have we arranged, relocated, and distributed the resources in our struggle

Paleolithic creatures such as Australopithecus, Neanderthal, or Homo Habilis who lived approximately two to three hundred thousand years ago, were nomadic hunter, gathers. Before the advent of fire and tool making (100,000 years ago) they were primarily vegetarian, and did virtually n construction. These nomads, around 9-12,000 years aco, began to deliberately plant the seeds of known food plants. The central areas of crigin of the agricultural revolu-tion are 1)Tigres-Euphrates area(Garden of Eden), 2)Nile-Nigeria area, and 3)Yellow-Yang Tze area (near east), made it possible for the two legged nomads to settle. The fertile river banks and savannahs now could be counted on to be an endless food

Unaware of the environmental and genetic intricacies of our actions, our evolutionaru predecessors were restructuring the en cycles between humans and plants(friends Improved nutritional conditions and more shelter from the elements reduced mortality and death rates, which began a marked upswing in the rate of population growth. This was at the expense of other species'

Rapid growth of our towns and settlecreated a pressure to further restruc ture the environment to obtain more food. More food, more people...more people, more environmental manipulation. A symbiosis was created where the plants were dependent upon us for harvesting and seed dispersal, and we were dependent on the plants fo. feeding our large and expanding population.



By 3,000 B.C. we had developed irrigation methods, domesticated animals and plants. extensive craftsmaking and constuction a bilities. Mere survival was no longer the sole life task; it had evolved and expanded to include cultural, society and civilty.

By the time of the Industrial revolution, all the "new lands" of the world had been discovered and colonized. Our technologies were still rapidly advancing. A handful of plants and animals were sustaining million's of people. The Industrial Revolution was most drastic, to the point of catastrophic restructuring of the environment's en-

By introducing fossil fuels such as coal, we are using energy that is not other-wise a part of the ecosystem. The real prob-lem in this is not the added energy per se, or even the pollutants from very inefficient combustion processes, but the essential mis-take is that these energy sources take mil-lions of years to be produced; they are nonrenewable. Supporting a population on a finite source of energy is running a cours? toward social genocide, or collapse at

Major technological advancements of this period that promoted further popula-tion increases were: improved sanitation and personal hygiene(soap), refrigeration and food storage, and advancement of med-ical knowledge and procedures. Today, widespread environmental de-

terioration, inequality of distribution, mass over-consumption of resources and energy, the arms race and nuclear fission threaten the quality and sheer existence of life on Earth as we know it. With the splitting of the atom in 1945, and with the increasing water, air, and soil pol-lution, the notion of worldwide destruction has only recently become a reality.

In our techno-cultural search for Utopia, we have created a mega-powered bomb of overconsumption, pollution, and nuclear jeopardy. Our understanding and comprehension of the world around us is Our understanding and now very vast, and sufficient to create any sort of world we desire. We know by example that a Hell on Earth is technically pos-sible. What of Utopia? Can we create an

To rejoin all our energy/resource uses with the cycles of our living ecos ere, to accept the limitations that life is regulated by, to make our socio-economic and political structures cohesive with the bioeconomics of the Earth; these are our tasks inorder to move toward Eco-topia.

There are two facets of the task at The first is by far the easier onethe technical aspect. How do we conduct our agricultural and social practices on solar-biological energy? What are the technical applications of our present technology to the new technologies? How large a population can we support in this manner?

The obstacle to such social change is within our social structure itself. Socioeconomic patterns based on personal motives such as greed and the concept of constant and seemingly limitless growth have domin-ated our social progress for thousands of years. The decadence and overconsumption of the first world is a lifestyle that this Earth can no longer support. The exploitation of the third world, of those without resources, of the working class, have allowed a small fraction of our population to consume the resources that belong to everuone. (They are not even ours, really) Futurists and activists of all kinds

working to alter these patterns. task, as Alvin Toffler(author of Future Shock) explains it, it is not to avoid the future, but to shape the future by realizing that it is now. Now is the time to work for the future. Social change does not begin in the White House or the Kremlin, or even in the picket lines, and non-viclent civil disobedient acts; social change begins with every soul, values must change for the social-values as a whole to change.

Youth of the world, WE ARE THE FU URE! What sort of future are you living toward?

#### GEORGES BANK

In the past several years oil spills have increased in both number and serious-ness. Many individuals and organizations have a growing concern for the damaged marine environment from these spills. In Mass., this concern resulted in the post ponement of the sale of leases to drill for oil in Georges Bank.

Georges Bank is one of the most impor-tant fisheries: producing one eighth of the world's catch. A question in many minds is, "would the amount of oil taken from Georges Bank justify the danger which drilling presents to a healthy ecology and to the fish-ing industry that depends on it?"

The immediate affects of oil are much more visible than long term pollutants, yet the effects of oil on ocean ecology last long after the slick has been contained. Phytoplankton and Zooplankton (one celled plants and animals at the bottom of the ocean food chain) ingest oil hydrocarbons but are not able to break them down for release. Fortunately, fish who feed on plankton are able to release oil, but the breakdown may effect how they taste. After being ingested and released, oil settles into the ocean floor

where it can persist for up to seven years; affecting several generations of fish. Even without large spills, offshore drilling can be dangerous to ocean life. The waters around a drilling platform be-come heavy with discharged Petroleum and me tals. Cancer man develop in the larvae of croanisms throughout the area.

Because of these and other dangers, pe-

titions were sent to the President and all New England Governors; urging that no lease

sales be made until more could be done to protect the ocean environment. The Conservation Law Foundation (CLF) and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts issued a complaint against the sales. U.S. District Judge W. Arthur Garrity issued an injunction to postpone the sales shortly before they were to take place.

In September of 1978, the Outer Continental Shelfs Land Acts amendment was passed through congress, and signed by President Carter. The amendments call for, among othe things, that the authority cancel any lease in the case of a large spill, and improved environmental studies to be made. The Mass. Department of Interior, and the oil companies feel the injunction was called as a delay until these amendments could be passed, and therefore, should now be lifted. Environment alists are not satisfied. Many feel the injunction should not be lifted until further studies can be made and more stringent regulations imposed.

Georges Bank is not the only area whose future is in doubt. Pollution from offshore drilling and large tankers threaten many coastal areas of both the Atlantic and the

Oil companies continue to push for the speedy development of offshore drilling cites. As old oil reserves decrease and our energy consumption rises, this push will become even stronger.



This was taken to court and is pending trial in New Found-If the case goes to trial before March 10, 1979 (opening of hunting season)


#### ALTERNATIVE ENERGY

The term "solar energy" has only in the last few years become newsworthy, yet in reality the sun is the energy source that all of life on earth depends on. All human creatures-agriculture, civilization, and industry have directly or indirectly relied on solar energy for existence.
The difference between fossil fuels,

plant products decomposed and fossilized over millions of years, and other forms of solar energy is that more direct solar energy is within the ecosystem. All the nutrient, life, air, and water cycles are regulated by the solar energy radiated to us every day. Supporting a population on a finite, non-renewable source of energy, such as fossil fuels, sets the stage for such as fossil fuels, sets the stage for an inevitable Crisis: a social/industrial power failure, if you will. When discussing the application of solar energy in our society; or more appropriately, the realignment of our society's energy processes within the eco-system, there are two points to consider. First, is the technical question of "How do we utilize this vast energy source?" The second is far trickier, "How can a society addicted to decadence and overconsumption accept such disastic channes overconsumption accept such drastic changes as this would imply, and how do we facili-tate these changes?" I will deal now with the technical applications only, for lack of space. But in a word or two, social change does not begin in the government structure, or in techno-industrial corp ations, social change begins within indiv-idual people.

Most people think of solar panels or solar-electric conversion cells when they hear "solar energy". This is only a part of the story. Radiant energy, experienced as heat and light, is how we first receive solar energy. In December, 1972, the Radiant energy. tional Science Foundation/NASA released their report on extensive solar energy po-tential studies. They concluded that by 2020 solar energy could economically sup-ply 35% of the nation's heating and cooling ply 3% of the mation's neating and cooling needs, 30% of our gaseous oil needs (that's bio-gas, we'll get to that), 10% of our liquid fuel, and 20% of our electrical needs. Solar-electric conversion cells are like little chemical alloid wafers that con-

vert the photo energy into electricity. Presently they are very expensive and relatively inefficient. The thought of huge (50 sq. km.) solar panols orbiting the earth has been conjectured, but the energy and economic inputs would outweigh their out-Plus, satellites are difficult to keep in orbit for more than a few years.



Passive solar panels work on heat absorbtion, commonly known as the greenhouse effect. There are two kinds of panels. Copper pipes may circulate water through the panel, into a large storage tank, then back to the panel. A solar panel has double glazed glass or plastic fronts, with a dull glazed glass or plastic fronts, with sub-black back. The other kind is air-to-rock, when air is circulated through the panel, then through a large bin full of small peb-bles. The rock or water absorbs heat all day, then slowly radiates the heat back out all night. Even in the northern areas of the world, a passive solar system can sup-ply up to 55% of the apace and water heat-

ply up to 55% of the space and water heat-ing needs of any properly designed build-ing. Mearer the equator, all heating and content needs can be met. Bydro and wind power are also forms of solar energy, as it is the heat from the sun that creates the movement. Al-most all electricity is generated by rotating magnets around each other. Power companies use huge turbines propelled by steam. The steam is produced by combus tion of wood, coal, or oil, or (HEAVEN FORBID) nuclear fission. Before the Rural Electrification Act of 1933, wind

generators were an integral part of rurgenerators were an integral part of rur-al America. The typical Dutch-type wind-mill was actually French/English in or-igin, dating back to the 12th century. During both the 1930's and the 1950's, German, Russian, and French scientists were exparimenting with large small (1904) were experimenting with large scale (150-300 kwatts) wind turbines. The Energy Re-search Development Administration of NASA has been conducting extensive tests on all facets of wind energy.

Hydro power used to supply 40% of the

nguro power used to supply 40% or the nation's electricity, now it barely sup-plies 20%. This nation's rivers could sup-ply up to 60% of our electrical needs, a potential gross energy mource of 80 million horsepower. Where twenty feet or more of headwater (height between water level a dam and water level at turbines) can be water level at tained or a relatively short conduct (less than 100 feet) can be built into a small river to lead the water to the turbines. Hydro-electric power can be economically feasible. Hechanical use of water wheels can be used to mill grains, turn latches, pump air or water (like in your solar sys-tem), or anything else you desire a rela-tively slow rotary action for. By far, the largest category of solar river to lead the water to the turbines.

energy is the bio-mass, all living matter. Plants, by virtue of their cloroplasts, are able to convert radiant photoenergy directly into carbohydrates. All heter trophs (non-plants) depend on photosyn-All heterothesis for their energy. Utilization of bio-mass can be burning wood for heat, using fibers for insulation, and for composting and organic gardening. The most promising utilization is in bio-gas pro duction in methane digesters. As aerobic bacteria (non-oxygen breathing) breaks pacteria (non-oxygen preatning) preaks down organic wastes in water, giving off methane gas as a biproduct. With an octane rating of 120 or higher, methane gas burns completely, with virtually no effluents(polluting bi-products). By using waste products from agriculture, and people a radius gas a lighteria to the product of the produc waste products from agriculture, and people to produce gas, we would be eliminating two pollution problems in one throw. The di-gested sludge is a highly nutritive fertil-

At this point, it is self-evident that the ecosystem can supply our society vast energy in various forms. The obstacles are not technological, but socio-economic and political. The age of decadence must end; the computer age must slow to avoid a collossal collapse of our society.

I just know that to me it is. I went over that discussion in my mind on the bus ride back to Boston: What is re-

ligion? What is philosophy? How can they be integrated? Are they exclusive of each other? Is Unitarian Universalism a religion?

Several dictionary definitions and pon-derings later, I came to the conclusion that whether the Unitarian Universalist religious potential is realized or not depends upon the environment, i.e. the church. I fear that many UUs get caught in intellectual paralysis where every thought and action is analyzed (and sterilized) to the point where it becomes next to impossible to do new things. Hence the image of UUs being philosophers and armchair revolutionaries.
Unitarian Universalism depends upon

individuals and groups to act upon their personal beliefs. UU philosophy and religion have to be recognizable separate entities; equally important is that they be incorporated and blended together into every aspect

So my answer to the woman interviewing me would be more elaborate but essentially the same: "To me Unitarian Universalism is a religion."
