



Haven't you always wondered how people can be so entirely artsy-craftsy and talented, when you seem to be totally untalented? Well, I used to be a totally untalented flop As a matter of fact, I didn't think I would As a matter of fact, I didn't think I would ever amount to much. No, not without a hobby. I never took all those art classes at the YMCA and I never took a camp craft course. I learned everything the hard way. The easy way. This may seem confusing at first, but if you think about it, the hard way to your average Joe Schmoe can sometimes be the eas-

iest way for your not so average dee...YOU!
For an example I am going to use silkscreening. Now, mind you, you can't expect to produce superior quality artwork with inferior equipment, but you can have a lot of fun and learn what not to do by doing everything wrong. It may seem backwards to in-tentionally do everything wrong, but I think it is easier, less time-consuming, and can be a heck of a lot of fun for not much money.

When you are silkscreening, you need a few hasic things that will cost you some money--but not so much so that you will delete your savings in an afternion. You will need the following: 1) A frame. It can be any size, however you do not want it to be more than a few inches larger than your de-sign all the way around. It must be flat, meaning that if you make it you must use boards, nailed or stapled and to end so that the ends are even. You will need a piece of nylon silk. This you can buy at a graphic art supply store. Get the cheapest kind, since you're doing it the wrong way. Next you will need staples. First, staple Next you will need staples. First, staple one end as straight as you can and he sure to leave plenty of room for the silk to reach all sides tightly. Next staple the opposite end of the frame, stretching the fabric tightly and evenly in order to keep the sides from wrinkling or gathering. Now, do the last two sides, being sure that the screen is pulled tightly. Remember, if you screw it up it will show in the final draft of your project. 3) You will need ink. This comes in many different forms. You can decide which kind from the following description:

Water soluable--Will wash out.

Hater soluable—Hill wash out. Should only be used on paper or othen materials that will not become wet at any time. If these get wet they will wash out or run. Oil--Not water soluable—This ink is permanent. Although with age it may fade slightly or crack it will not wash out. If you decide to use this kind of ink be sure to wear a smock or something. It is really messy stuff. Something that you should be aware of when printing with this ink is that it takes paint thinner or remove ink is that it takes paint thinner or remover to wash out the ink. A word to the wise. Paint thinner or remover can be quite harsh so if you decide to use oil ink it is better f you decide to use oil in it is better if you use rubber gloves, especially if you have sensitive skin. Paint thinner can burn the skin, so be careful. Oil paint can be a really terriffic ink except that it takes a long time to dry. It flows nicely and is good for holding vivid color.

Acrylic--Not water soluable after it s. This stuff is really neat. It can be dries. This stuff is really neat. It can be washed off the screen with water but it will not wash out after it dries. It will however fade with age but is still the niftiest stuff

rade with age but is still the hittlest stur-for clean-up.

Photo-sensitive--Not water soluable after it dries. This ink is really nifty to work with. It cleans up easily while still wet yet when it dries it is permanent. The special quality of this ink is both a novelty and a drawback. It develops much the same as does a polaroid picture. This ink is sensitive to ultra-violet rays and develops when exposed to direct sunlight or develops when exposed to direct sunlight or to a ultra-violet lamp. The drawback is that when you screen it, it tends to screw up since you cannot see the finished result until it is exposed to the light. This means that if you screw up the printing then you cannot touch it up. If you try to touch it up then you will undoubtedly end up painting on more ink then you would if you had screened it on. What this means is that the correction will be darker than the rest of the design.

There are also vinyl inks, but I don't know much about them. I'll let you look for those yourself...

You will need a squeegee. This is a tool to scrape the ink along the screen to push the ink through the small holes in the screen and thus onto your project. It can be anything from a rubber professional squeegee anything from a rubber professional squeegee to a piece of heavy cardboard. If you use cardboard be sure to remember that cardboard with use, will get soft and soggy, so keep a large supply on hand. If this doesn't work, use your imagination! Look at how the screening process works, and then find something in the house that will work. It could be one of your mother's rubber scrapers (some people call them spatulas). Your best bet is to have a squeegee roughly the same size as your screen, so that the ink same size as your screen, so that the ink
will go on the paper fairly evenly. We don't
want streaks now, do we?
You'll also need a stencil. There are
many types of stencils available—everything

many types of stencils available--everything from paper to photo sensitive gelatin. I will just go over the basic, cheap ones, and their application here.

Paper--the simplest. All that is needed is a piece of paper of some substance, preferably not too absorbant. I suprace waved paper would work especially well if you could find some way to adhere it. I think something like vegetable oil or maybe Karo syrup would work-as long as it's water-soluble and not pigmented. All you really need is some kind of sticky substance that is not permanent. Generally paper is the easiest way to go. Take an exacto knife and cut away every area that you want to be colored, much like a negative, and then place the way every area that you want to be colored, much like a negative, and then place the finished design onto your screen. The ink will adhere the design once you have run the pattern once. (The reason you need to adhere the waxed paper is that the waxed surface makes the paper very slippery and it will take some mighty quick thinking to keep the paper in place while getting ready to ink the screen.)

Hydro-Amber-This is a gelatin film

Hydro-Amber-This is a gelatin film much like those peel and eat smashed fruits that you can find in the midwest.(If you live in Ohio, forget it.) The name "hydroamber" is a brand name, not a generic name, so if it comes under a different name, or is not orange, do not fret. This stuff is extremely expensive—you'll have to lay out about \$4.00 per square foot. The simplicity of it, however, makes it quite worthwhile. It comes on a tough, clear plastic backing, and is applied with water. You work it much like paper, except that it is much easier to cut, and it doesn't ravel like paper. The only problem with hydro-amber is that it can be tricky to apply. You only need a small amount of water, and if you aren't careful you will end up with it running all over the place--quite a mess. The only thing that will prevent this from happening is practice--but this is expensive and a real drag. The theory behind any of these methods is to block the pores of the fabric so that the ink cannot flow through. So if the gelatin runs, it blocks the pores of the fabric, and the ink cannot flow through

Another drawback with hydro-amber is that it is water soluble. When using water-sol-uble inks, you need to be aware that if you want to use your design the next day, you can't rinse off the screen with water--that would destroy the stencil. It is possible to just wipe off the screen without destroying the stencil. It is generally pretty sturdy sturf, but be careful! It can be

quite tricky. Block-out-This is really fun stuff if you are coordinated at using a small paint brush or just enjoy using a spattered effect on your screen. This is used much like paint. You paint the block-out on all areas that you don't want the ink to come through. It is fairly cheap, I think, and will last you a good long while. It's generally handy to have around especially if you are using one of the other methods and part of your sten-cil comes off, or you decide that you don't want something that is already inked to come

There are several other types of stencils, such as photo sensitive that require lots of equipment and preparation. I won't go into that, for the sake of keeping this simple and avoiding processes that I could not get to work...If you want to try any process that I haven't mentioned, well, go ahead, but don't say I didn't warn you.

Basically this is all you need to do
a slipshod job and have a lot of fun silkscreening. Some other things that will come in handy are: a spoon, an apron, various in nandy are: a spoon, an apron, various pieces of unmarred cardboard to prevent bleeding (not you--the print!), a workbench or old table that mom and dad won't kill you for if you just happen to mess it up.

Pon't let any of these tries stop you from being creative. I none cleaned off a screen by spraying it not with a backyard

Now that you have the basics...I feel like letting you go with that and hope that you could fend for yourself, but don't worry! I wouldn't wish that on myself, so I won't do it to you...

So now you are sitting at a workbench with all your equipment sitting our in front of you, all ready to begin, any you don't know quite what to do first. Well! Let's see what we can do about that. First of all make sure you have plenty of paper towelsmake sure you have piency of paper towers—
you'll probably use up thousands of them
before you've gotten off the ground. It may
be helpful to get the really cheap ones you
get at school, or a gas station—if you have
the connections. But, then again, I'm one
of those people who doesn't like to use a

You need to make sure your screen is tight. It doesn't need to be so tight that you use up three blocks and tackels to get it that way--just tight enough so that the screen gives only a little when pressed. It should feel firm.

Should feel firm.

O.K. You've got your screen and your paper towels and ink and all that sort of stuff. Fine and dandy, but you do need to have a design...no. I refuse to help you with that. Once you have settled on a design, you have to cut it out and apply it to the screen. This can be done over a period of time and if you use Hydro--Amber or blockout you will have to wait several hours for it to dry. Don't rush it or you will end up it to dry. Don't rush it or you will end up

ruining it.

Let the stencil dry. If it feels sticky give it more time. Peel off any plastic backing and get ready for a cheap thrill...

YOUR FIRST SILK SCREENING PROJECT!!!...The first run of your project is really exciting and you never know just what will happen to your pattern. Suspense! After working with

your pattern. Suspense! After working with a negative for a while, you get used to it, and when the finished project appears you find that it is more than you expected.

OK, now you're ready to screen. Take a good-sized spoonful of ink from the can or bottle, and make a line of the goop across the screen. Do it sort of near the top of or bottle, and make a line of the goop across the screen. Do it sort of near the top of the screen, but enough behind the screen to be able to get your squegee behind it. This should be well off your design, to make sure that all of your project gets inked. Next, spread the ink across the screen in a scraping motion, so that it is pushed through the pattern and the fabric. Use pressure, but not much--you don't want to scrape off the stencil, now do you? Go back and forth the long way a couple of times until you get the feel of the ink, and you think you have it down pat. However, if you look under the screen by picking it up you will have to be extremely careful so that you don't move the screen. If you do, you will inevitably end up with a double exposure. World to the niave... Do not start screening on cloth or a I-Shirt until you have run the pattern off on a piece of paper several times. If you print prematurely, you will screw up a lot of I-Shirts.

Some Questions and Answers About the Draft

compiled by Maida Sunley and Julie Farman

I just had my eighteenth birthday. Do I have to register for the draft?

There is no requirement for you to register right now. Peacetime registration was suspended in 1975 but it may be resumed in the near future.

Where is my draft board?

Local draft boards were shut down after the draft was placed on standby. However, Selective Service may revive local boards o-ver the next few months. It is unclear what role new board members will have.

Will Selective Service process my claim for a deferment?

Selective Service refuses to consider any claims. Because the draft is on standby right now, all classification and processing activities have been suspended.

What does Selective Service have in store for

Selective Service is currently in a volatile state. A lot of people in Congress and in the Pentagon would like to see the draft return. Selective Service claims that a program of national registration "would best serve the security interests of the nation." The draft law itself is already on the books. All that is needed for resumption of registration is for Congress to wote Selective Servetice. All that is needed for resumption of registration is for Congress to vote Selective Service more funding, and for the President to announce a mass registration. Using plans that have already been developed for each of the 50 states, Selective Service would swing into action starting with a publicity campaign. Registration activities (possibly including in the classification, testing, and physical exams) would likely be conducted by the National Guard and Reserves in polling stations, schools, campuses, community centers, and pubschools, campuses, community centers, and pub-lic buildings. Registration information would be stored in government computers in Washing-ton under the Selective Service System's new-ly developed "Emergency Military Man curement System.

Will women have to register?

Under current law, women would not have under current law, women would not have to register if registration were resumed. However, large numbers of women do enlist in the volunteer army and this is one argument used by those in favor of enlisting women. Legislation requiring women to submit a registration has already been introduced in Congress. If the draft is reinstituted, there is a strong possibility that women will be subject to it.

I am a conscientious objector. How can I

Anyone can be a conscientious objector. Whether you are a male or a female, young or old, it is important for you to think through your response to the problem of war and find concrete ways to implement your beliefs. The Selective Service System does not provide the Opportunity for the selective CO all the selective Service System does not provide the Selective Service System does not provide the opportunity for you to make a CO claim at present. If registration is reactivated, you will not be able to register as a CO then elther. Under present draft plans, the only time you will be able to make a claim for recognition is after you have recieved your induction notice in the event of mobilization. Although you can't make an official claim right now, you might want to take one of the following steps:

Write a statement outlining the reacons.

following steps:
Write a statement outlining the reasons.
for your objection to participation in the
military and send it to Selective Service anyway. Have the statement notarized, and send
it by mail, return receipt requested, to Selective Service, 600 E Street, Washington, D.C.
20435. The Selective Service is likely to

re con the statement to you, and its legal value is unclear at this point. There is no guarantee that your attempt to file a statement with the Selective Service System will help you obtain CO status later on, but it might help. You can also file a copy of the statement with your meeting or congregation, with Friends Peace Committee, or with CCCO/An Agency for Military and Draft Counseling. (2016 Walnut St., Philadelphia, PA 19103.)

If you are opposed to conscription and would refuse to register or cooperate with the draft machinery, you can join others by signing a declaration of your intent to refuse to cooperate. If the government expects resistance to registration, they may back

down from their plans. Willful nonregistra-ion and noncooperation will probably be con-sidered a felony, punishable with fines and imprisomment. Urging others to refuse to register or cooperate could also be regarded as a crime. Despite the possible danger involved, vou should know that civil disobedience has long history in the U.S., starting with the Imerican Revolution.

So what's wrong with registration?

Registration itself seems like a harmless administrative procedure. Selective Service wants it to look that way so it will be as non-controversial as possible. Even though they may not realize it, those who register automatically enter the Pentagon's military manpower pool. In reality, registration is the first step in the conscription process, and conscription itself is the problem. Many Americans are opposed to the draft because Americans are opposed to the draft because they believe it is a form of slavery which is promitted by the Thirteenth Amendment. Thousands of our forbears came to these shores to escape the draft.

I'm not sure where I come out on this issue. Now can I prepare myself to find an answer?

There is no one "best way" to find the There is no one "best way" to find the answer. There are several steps you can take to explore the issue. The most important thing to remember is that you don't have to fit the government's description of what a conscientious objector is. Ask your family for help or talk it over with your friends. If you belong to a church, talk it over with the minister and others there. Remeber, it's your life, not the government's. You have to make your mom decision, but getting advice to make your own decision, but getting advice and support from people who have faced the draft might he'p out.

What can I do about military recruiting in

Armed forces recruitment is a slick oper-ation and it is frequently carried out in junfor and senior high schools and colleges. R cruiters themselves are often under pressure to deliver and they frequently make promises they can't keep. You may feel like you have to go along with the crowd, but remember: you are not required to participate in military-related activities at school. No one has the right to force you to participate in armed forces recruiting against your conscience and you may not be punished for refusing to do so. If you are opposed to military involvement in your school, explain your views to your counselor or principal and ask your parents to do the same. Try to present a non-military perspective. to deliver and they frequently make promises itary perspective.

What should I be on the lookout for in my

Military personnel may be active in your school in a number of ways. Sometimes recruiters take out ads in the school newspaper or yearbook. You might see armed forces personnel in your school talking to classes, pre-

senting testion more assume thowing movies. Recruiters might purpue γ_0 , invite you out, or call you at home to try and get you interested in joining the military.

Looking ahead...

look at all the issues and take time to reflect. Make your own decision about participating in the military. If you don't, the government may make it for you. Figuring out your response to the challenge of militarism is an on-going process. Being a CO is not just a status—it is one way of expressing your commitment to peacemaking.

(1) The idea that there is an unlimited supply of everything; and (2) that we would be constantly expanding. These principles led to our definition of a "civilized" culture, which in essence (although you won't find this in Webster's) is any culture which has learned to dominate and control Nature and their own natures. David Himme, on whose philosophy our consticontrol Nature and their own natures. David Himme, on whose philosophy our constitution is based, clearly justifies the fact that women are inferior to men by pointing out that women haven't created any "civilized" cultures. What I want to ask is, Do we want to create a "civilized" culture? When Blacks learned to dominate Nature, they were proclaimed "equal." Do we want equality at the price of giving up our own natures and surrendering to a

up our own natures and surrendering to a patriarchal system?
So back to the draft. The obvious answer to the question, If it's OK to draft men, isn't it OK to draft men in the first place. And it's not OK to draft women. And we don't "owe" anything to the government, let alone collusion in as patriarchal and misogynist an institution as the draft repardless of wheth

as patriarchai and misogynist an instit-ution as the draft, regardless of whether or not they give us "equal" rights. ! want to quote part of a speech giv-en by Karen Lindsay, a feminist poet, since I don't think I could say it any

better.
"...I think we can discount all the hand-wringing gallentries of the conservatives who can't bear to think of women getting killed in a war. I doubt, really that any draft would actually send women into combat duty--not because of their concern for our lives, but because of their concern for their lives. No male subremacist culture can afford to have a population tion of vound women trained to respon to tion of young women trained to respon to provocation with violence. Women are haprovocation with violence. Momen are harassed every day verbally, physically, sexually by men, and I don't think the government will risk training us to fight back with force. No, we'll be drafted into so-called peaceful work--typing, nursing, or in the liberals "alternative" schemes, into doing useful civilian work in hospitals, etc.

'On the surface, this can sound de-

"On the surface, this can sound deceptively benign. Why not have young women doing decent work for a few years? In the first place, because the horror of forced labor isn't in the nature of the work, but in the fact that it is forced labor-slavery is slavery whatever the masters have the slaves doing. "Secondly, even if you could justify forcing men into alternative service and you can't-I'd still agree that it is irong to draft women. Ne've paid our lues-the stuff they're talking about is the work women have been drafted into doing for centuries-and not for any two or four year time limit either. If we pwed that kind of work to society, we've paid what we owe already, a thousand time: over.

"But let's not kid ourselves draft isn't ultimately about emptying bedpans; it's not about civilian work. The draft is about war. The draft is about providing a ready force of soldiers to go out and kill at a moment's notice. No women who cares about the welfare of of other women and a support that Whatof other women can support that. What-ever else it is, war is a patriarchal in-stitution, and every war is against women Because women are the mothers of the men who fight and die, certaintly. But also-and our government would love up to for-get this-because women are the victims-of war, whether or not we are soldiers, whether or not we are trained to fight. It's easy to forget this, living in a country on whose soil no war has been fought for over a century. But if we really care about sisterhood, about fighting the destruction of patriarch united by the second of the sec fighting the destruction of patriarch u-niversally, we must remember it. And we can't allow ourselves to be used as inoc-uous jobs so men can be freed to go and kill people. I'm not saying that every soldier rapes and kills women, but every soldier is permitted to--even, I suspect, encouraged to--and the social restrictions that work to mitigate male violence in civilian life, weak enough in themselves, are entirely absent in war.

Another thing you have to do in order to have a successful silk screen project is to mask the screen. The idea is to have only the ink flowing through the stencil. If you have a stencil that is not quite as large as the screen' then you have to put masking tape on the edges so that only the stencil brea will show up inked. Take masking tape and run it along the edge inside and out of the screen to block out any outline of the frame. At the same time mask the entire frame, that way you won't have to have the ink spilled on the frame and it makes it easier to re-silk the frame if it gets gross.

Masking tape will hold up fairly well under almost any condition, if you use enough.

Well now you will probably find that if you use this as a quide to silk screening that I will have undoubtedly left out many things so please feel free to improvise. And if I have left out so much that it doesn't work, then work it out for yourself... Gee Whiz guys, that is how I learned to silk screen...

I am an LRYer that many people know. I have been to three G.A's, and I've attended a lot of conferences in my area,

tended a lot of conferences in my area, as well as being one of the Youth Caucus representatives of my district for a year. My name is Sarah Snow. I've got dark brown eyes and dark brown hair and I'm notorious for my smile, which I wear often. But that's all beside the point. I've got a BIG problem and it could have happened to anyone.

I have scoliosis. That means my back is curved. My spine looks like an "S" when it is supposed to look like as traight line. In a nut shell, my problem is that all the medical doctors say that I have to have surgery, which means putting two metal bars in my back so that my spine won't curve more, and they'll fix the present curve about 50 percent. I'll lie on a hospital bed, perpercent. I'll lie on a hospital bed, per-fectly still, for one and one-half weeks, and then in a cast for nine months, with the possibility of other problems and risks the possibility of other problems and risks later in life, as well as during surgery. I wen' to chiropractor who told me that there is a possibility that he can straighten my back enough so that I won't need surgery. My parents refused to give him permission to try. They think he is a charlatan. I want him to try, and then if it does not work, I will be satisfied with the surgery. If it does, well then I'll be a lot better off for the rest of my life.

I've been talking to my parents for weeks now and researching the problem as well, but my parents are not seeing reason. The thing that really frustrates me is that I have no rights. I am not an adult. If my parents say that I can not go to the chiropractor, I can't go! Legally, if they say I must have surgery, I will have it. (Legally, the only way I have any say about

my body is if I'm married or pregnant.)
The hospital will not perform surgery on
me if I don't want it though. Any court
would be on my side although I have no lewould be on my side although I have no iterate gal rights. It is not fair. I am an intelligent, level-headed, responsible young lady and I've proved it in my dealings with adults, as a member of many boards, and the G.A. I believe I am as capable as any ad-G.A. I believe I am as capacia as any adult, (and more capable than many) to decide what will happen to my own body. My body belongs to me, not to my parents. Certainty I am my parents' responsibility, and I love them very much. They did a wonderful job of raising me to be a mature woman, but I believe strongly that my body should be my responsibility. I have already refused the surgery, and I'll probably have to wait until I'm eighteen to visit the chiropractor. Does this seem fair to you? This is not the whole story, because it does not give any of the research that was done. you care, or know anything that might


backpacking cross country and becoming a UU minister.

There are also many other events which take place at GA that youth may participate in -- workshops done by various organizations within the UUA (such as LRY), business sessions, worship services and lectures, as well as just getting to know other Unitarian and Universalist people from around the Con-

Last year there were over 1,000 atten dees at GA, with almost 100 Youth Caucus members, and hopefully this year will be just as successful.
